## Resonant Realism

- releases us from the false polarity between absolute certainty and absolute doubt
- frees us from simple correspondence theories of truth
- releases us from the attempt to find an Archimedean point, a "God's-eye view"
- frees us from the false polarity between passive subject and inert object
- reminds us that a key test of whether we are in touch with reality is fruitfulness



## Resonant Space

sight problems - 'zero-sum' theology

....trinitarian struggles and pathologies

sound doctrine

"in-one-anotherness" of Father and Son (e.g. Jn. 10:38; 14:10)

John 15 – believers in Jesus, Jesus in believers

John 14: 23 – Father-and-Son in believers

John 14:17 – the Spirit in us

John 17:20

<sup>20</sup> My prayer is not for them alone. I pray also for those who will believe in me through their message, <sup>21</sup> that all of them may be one, Father, just as you are in me and I am in you.

## Resonant Expansion

John 17:4-5

<sup>4</sup> I have brought you glory on earth by finishing the work you gave me to do. <sup>5</sup> And now, Father, glorify me in your presence with the glory I had with you

before the world began.
